The Maine Medical Association launched the Center for Quality Improvement in October of 2020 with services and projects that span the continuum of care from perinatal to older adult initiatives in Maine.

The CQI serves as a neutral convener committed to transforming health and health care in Maine. CQI has multiple statewide, innovative clinical and quality improvement initiatives such as PQC4ME, which is Maine's center of excellence for perinatal quality improvement. The CQI team will continue this mission through several of its current projects that focus on an array of topics such as:

- Improving care coordination and access to resources to address opioid/substance use disorder
- Improving the rates of HPV vaccinations through a quality improvement collaboration
- Integrating AIM patient safety bundles in all Maine birthing hospitals
- Developing online on-demand learning modules for clinicians

Our Impact

Opioid Safe Prescribing and Treatment of OUD

Assisted 23 Emergency Departments in initiating Buprenorphine in the ED

Provided Technical Assistance to Liaisons across Maine's 16 counties for post-overdose outreach. The liaisons engagement resulted in:

- 1,273 co-response calls alongside law enforcement
- 1,702 post overdose follow-ups
- 1,575 clients referred to community-based treatment programs. 80% attended their first appointments
- 1,850 individuals referred to community-based recovery support programs
- 4,966 individuals trained in overdose and anti-stigma education
- 4,470 kits (8,940 doses) of naloxone distributed



Maternal, Perinatal, and Child Health Improvement

Increased number of birthing hospitals participating in the AIM Severe Hypertension in Pregnancy Bundle from 9 to 21

Received 2 Cooperative Agreements from the US CDC to formalize and grow PQC4ME, and to expand the MFIMR Panel

Expanded the Universal Maternal Naloxone Project by two additional hospitals in 2022

Offered 432 postpartum people first aid kits with naloxone: 371 kits were accepted, 324 included naloxone

Prevention

Built collaborative pathways for medical and dental professionals in Maine to work together to educate and promote HPV vaccinations

Had 228 HPV vaccination conversations across three dental clinics

Developed a pathway at an FQHC to vaccinate eligible patients with the HPV vaccine while in the dental chair:

94 HPV vaccinations administered



Growth By The Numbers

The Center for Quality Improvement became a program of the Maine Medical Association in October 2020. It began with a small group of employees who brought to the organization a few projects and their skills and experience managing health care quality improvement projects. During the next two years, CQI grew from a team of four to a team of seven and the number of projects grew from 12 to 24. The funding for these projects comes from local, state, national, governmental entities, non-profit organizations, and foundations.




- 11 projects funded by state governmental entities
